



Principal's Corner

Advance Your Child's Spiritual Life

This past week, I have traveled to and from several interviews in Wisconsin and Illinois. I have arrived early in the various cities to get a "lay of the land" plus I took the opportunity to spend some time sitting and walking along the river in all the cities visited. As I sat on the river banks, I prayed for myself as a new chapter of my life was beginning beyond Stoughton. My spirit was reenergized through the gentle breezes and the quiet lapping of the water. I experienced a sense of wonder and awe at how God is ever present and ever working in my life. My mind also wandered back to a workshop that I attended a few years ago entitled, "How to Advance a Child's Spiritual Life." The workshop shared some practical suggestions of how parents and teachers could guide children to develop spirituality. I offer these suggestions today to you.

Promote quiet time: Scripture reminds us, "Be still and know that I am God." (Psalm 46:10) Introduce a period of quiet time each day to your child where he or she can rest, read or just sit quietly and reflect upon God's presence in his/her life.

Model the spiritual life for your child: Like the apostles and the saints, be the best possible role model for your child through your words and actions. Be aware of your child's words, actions and values. Pay attention to how they treat friends, adults, strangers and animals. Model how to speak courteously to others, how to treat animals with kindness, how to show respect to people from all walks of life.

Teach your child to pray: As soon as your child can understand language, teach him/her how to pray. During Spring as you observe trees budding and flowers opening, thank God for the beauty of creation and the new life that surrounds us. Express gratitude to God for friends, for caring teachers and for loving family members. Pray whenever you hear a siren, asking God to watch over and bless anyone involved in an emergency. Create a litany of thanks as you share your evening meal together.

Encourage stewardship of the earth: Spirituality includes respect for what God has created and given to us. Teach your child to set time aside to collect newspapers, bottles and cans for recycling, to turn off the lights when they leave a room, not to litter, to walk or ride their bike whenever possible. Allow your child to plant bulbs, seeds or flowers and to take care of your yard throughout the year.

Help your child recognize God's presence in nature: Psalm 139 expresses awareness of God "in the heavens, during the dawn and on the far side of the seas." Pause with your child to praise God for the beauty of the Spring skies, for the gentle rain, for the budding trees and sprouting perennials. Pause and listen to the birds in the morning or stand under a starry sky. And remember, He said," It is good."

Stress the Golden Rule: "In everything, do to others what you would have them do to you, "Jesus taught. (Matthew 7:21) Whenever you see or hear your child acting unkind, remind them that they don't like to be treated badly themselves, so why treat others unkindly. If your child says that another child in school is being ridiculed and put down, comment about how sad and lonely that child must feel. This way you will elicit kindness from your child toward a classmate.

As this Spring unfolds and we approach the end of the school year, may your family be blessed with moments to pause, reflect and enjoy the presence of God in the activities and routines of your every day life. Enjoy the little joys which are spiritual moments... the smell of freshly baked cookies, a brilliant sunset, a swiftly moving cloud, a gentle rain shower, the hug of a child, an unexpected email from a friend....!

"That was REAL?" by Rustie Prechel, 2nd grade teacher

A few weeks ago, the second grade class was learning all about Holy Week. Thursday was our last day of class and we concluded by discussing some of the Holy Artifacts that exist today like the shroud of Turin, pieces of Jesus' cross, and Veronica's veil. When we were just about finished, one of the children blurted out quite seriously, "You mean that was REAL?" Unfortunately, very often non-Catholics and Catholics alike question the realities of what we read in the Bible.

I recently watched "Heaven is for Real' and "God's NOT Dead" at the movie theatre. In both of these movies a central theme was faith. Why is it difficult for us to believe that there is a heaven, or that God created the universe? One of the questions I hear so often is regarding Jesus' presence in the Eucharist. Second graders don't seem to have any problem with this question at all. They may question Jesus' death since a 7-year old has little experience with death; but it is much easier for them to accept Jesus in the Eucharist since they have so much experience with love.

A second grader knows and trusts that God loves them. They know that Jesus sacrificed for them just as their parents would sacrifice for them. They know that a body can be seen and a soul cannot; and that bread can be seen and Jesus' presence in the bread cannot. They accept all of this with faith and are so excited to receive Jesus!

If you need a renewal of faith, watch a second grader or the new members of our church (former RCIA candidates) as they receive Eucharist. Their faces show all the love of Jesus.
